

IT'S A BIG DEAL

A capital campaign is a big deal. It only comes along once in a long time, and it offers the opportunity to build and strengthen the church. But this really raises the question: build and strengthen the church in what way? What kind of future are we imagining? What sort of church are we dreaming of becoming? What kind of church is God calling us to be? Getting the vision right is absolutely critical, and that involves a lot of listening, praying, and conversation.

Over the past two years, the church has held an extensive listening campaign, seeking to include a deep and wide cross section of our members. We received over 200 distinct, actionable ideas, touching every aspect of the life of the church from the building to the people and everything in between. Now that I think of it, what's in between the building and the people? Maybe the plants? Anyway...What I was trying to say is that we heard a wide array of exciting dreams. Church Council, working with our capital campaign consultants Latz and Company, have done yeoman's work sifting and categorizing and prioritizing those 200 ideas. We have developed four pillars that support the church's vision for what is to come. Those are (drum roll please):

- Deepening the community of care at First United;
- Increasing the sustainability and accessibility of our building;
- Strengthening our social justice work; and
- Improving the church's financial position.

There is a lot more information to share, including a lot more specifics on what goes in to those four pillars, how much money it will take to achieve our goals, and what is the plan for how to raise that money. But I'm already running out of space for this cover article, so if you want to know more, you'll have to come to one of four upcoming information sessions. They will be held on Sunday mornings, at 9:45, in Centennial Hall. They will be held March 5, March 12, March 19, and March 26. They will be identical sessions so, although you're welcome to come as often as you'd like, we are asking that all our members make a special effort to attend one of these sessions.

Can't make it to one of those sessions? Do you have choir every week? Are you in Barbados until the daffodils bloom? Please just let me know that you would like to have a meeting about the capital campaign, and I'll figure out a way to make that happen.

March Peace Corner:

Peace, Peace...When There is No Peace

How do I write about the Middle East for the First United Peace Corner when there is no peace, and the U.S. is making it worse? Palestine/Israel, Lebanon, Syria, Turkey, Iraq...the list goes on. All of them are experiencing terrible upheaval because of the earthquake and the punishment of bombing during wartime, or because of U.S. foreign policy problems.

Have you noticed that we get lots of reports of earthquake damage inside Turkey, but very few from inside Syria? There are reasons for that! There is only one road that permits travel between Turkey and northwest Syria, and it was heavily damaged by the earthquake. There are big fissures in the road that make it impassable. How are the vehicles supposed to get to Syria with aid? Late addition: Over a week later, we learn that Syrian President Assad has agreed to three more roads, while some reports blame rebel groups for refusing to use additional roads. Stay tuned!

The earthquake crisis has prompted a public debate of sanctions imposed on countries by the U.S. Seen as a non-violent way of sending a message to rulers of a country, they end up hurting the people instead. The leaders manage to carry on their lives through liaisons with governments that support them, further establishing the split between the West and those who oppose the West (that means the U.S., these days).

Here is a sample of the coverage regarding sanctions from the New York Times:

The crisis has been so grave for the government of President Bashar al-Assad, a staunch ally of Iran and Russia, that it asked the European Union for emergency assistance. Mr. Assad's government is under E.U. sanctions, but humanitarian aid would be exempted. <u>Turkey-Syria Earthquake</u>: Millions Await Aid While Suffering Cold and Grief - The New York Times (nytimes.com)

The quake's toll in Syria is huge. As I write this on February 18, the numbers are 41,000 dead—35,000 in Turkey, and 6,500 in Syria--and there are many buildings inside Syria yet to be added to the total. Here is a February 9

Meanwhile, the new government of Israel is moving ahead with more actions that enforce the system of apartheid—something three human rights organizations have documented (B'Tselem.org – an Israeli human rights organization), Human Rights Watch-Palestine, and Amnesty International.

The prophet Jeremiah (Bible, chapter 8) warned about false messages of peace. Let us see beyond the rhetoric of foreign policy and focus on God's promise to be with us. The Bible tells us that God is with those who suffer. May those of us who are comfortable in our daily lives be challenged to look deeper into the effects of U.S. foreign policy.

"Though the mountains be shaken and the hills be removed, yet my unfailing love for you will not be shaken nor my covenant of peace be removed," says the Lord, who has compassion on you." Isaiah 54:10.




